

The trails are located between the High School and Middle School, with a pine grove, multiple streams with footbridges, a small pond, and remnants of an apple orchard. Log benches at four outdoor classrooms are for school kids and the public.

Access from: Williams Elementary School, (parking behind the Middle School); or at the High School (student parking area). Large map signs are located at the three trailheads, rear of Middle School, and two on the far side of the football field.

Messalonskee Stream Trail



Starting at the parking area off Kennedy Memorial Drive, the trail follows Messalonskee Stream, past an original CMP generating station. Further on, see the ruins of a former textile mill. The trail winds through a stunning hemlock forest, across 5 rustic foot bridges, then rises above the stream to the power line access road. Follow it, then turn left down to the Rice Rips dam. Take the steel catwalk along and over the old wooden penstock, following it to Rice Rips Road.

Directions

From Waterville, follow Kennedy Memorial Drive to just before the Messalonskee Stream bridge, turn right at the TRAIL sign to a small fenced-in parking area. From Oakland, cross the stream and turn left. From Colby College, drive down the Rice Rips Road and turn right at the bottom to a small parking area. Cross the road and follow the leaking penstock.





Quarry Road Recreation Area



13+ miles Easy Moderate Advanced

The City of Waterville and Friends of Quarry Road maintain this extraordinarily diverse set of trails for all seasonal uses and ability levels. During winter, 2.5k trails have snowmaking and lights and are groomed for skate and classic skiing, with competitions on some weekends. There are dedicated trails for snowshoeing and some limited downhill skiing with a short rope tow. During warmer months, trails are used for walking, running, and mountain biking.

Great views abound of Messalonskee Stream on one side, the steep hillside on the other (with limited rock climbing in the small quarry), and impressive woodlands throughout. www.quarryroad.org

Directions

Take Interstate 95 to exit #130. Go south on Route 104/Main Street (0.7 mi). Turn right onto Eustis Parkway (0.6 mi). Turn right onto North Street (0.1 mi), then right again onto Quarry Road just past Maine-General's Thayer Center for Health. Follow signs to parking areas and Welcome Center.



4 Colby College Trails



7.5 miles Easy Moderate

Colby's campus trails are for all interests and abilities. Runnall's Hill includes a short uphill climb through an open field, leading to wooded trails ideal for hiking or running. For mountain bikers, those trails connect to nearby trail networks. Perkins Arboretum, on the downhill side of Mayflower Hill Drive, offers a variety of footpaths in that 128 acre forested preserve. None of the trails are signed, but with the college in the center of the trail network, it's difficult to get lost.

The Trail Network is accessed from several locations on the Colby College campus.

Inland Woods & Pine Ridge 5 Inland Woods & Recreation Area



8 miles Easy Moderate

The Inland Woods Trail provides a convenient link to several miles of trails in the 144-acre Pine Ridge Recreation Area for people of all abilities and interests. From walking paths along meandering streams to old tote roads and twisty single-track mountain bike trails, this is one of Central Maine's most beautiful and surprisingly untouched natural areas. Trails are in the process of redevelopment

Directions

Enter the Inland Hospital campus from Kennedy Memorial Drive. Follow the TRAIL signs to a trailhead kiosk at the far corner of the parking lot behind the hospital. Trails can also be accessed via West River Road/Route 104: take Louise Avenue to Norman Street, turn left and park at Rummel's Field.



6 Merritt Nature Trail



Butch Merritt taught indoors and out-of-doors at Waterville's Junior High School. His trail loops from the parking lot, through the steep gullies, to Messalonskee Stream. The trail crosses land with highly erodible soils, remnants from when the Gulf of Maine, milky with silt and clay, flooded all of Central Maine briefly at the end of the last Ice Age (13,000 years ago). Walk through a pine/hemlock forest with patches of ferns, and emerge in the school bus parking area.

Waterville's JHS is opposite the Pine Ridge Golf Course on West River Road. Park at the far end of the parking lot, and follow signs downhill, through the

7 Thomas College Trail



The Sukeforth Family Trail System extends throughout the campus. A 6 foot wide trail with a hardened surface flows in and around the built-up portions and the baseball and soccer fields. It is wheelchair friendly, and about a mile long. A more extensive network of single- and double-track trails extends through the woods to the south of the football fields, some with dramatic views across the Kennebec River,

Directions Trails can be accessed from several points on campus, including all the major parking lots.

8 South End Trail



4 miles Easy

From Green Street Park, follow Summer Street sidewalks to Grove Street. Then enter the cemetery following signs to significant stone markers. Step down onto and along Water Street, taking in gorgeous views of the Kennebec River on a roadside trail, leading all the way to the Messalonskee Stream Confluence.

Directions

Park at Green Street Park, or at the Couture Field Baseball field.

Oxbow Trail



The Oxbow Trail is a short loop that follows Messalonskee Stream as it meanders around a tongue of land. The trail crosses habitats from pine woods and burr oaks, with winding vines of invasive oriental bittersweet. Tall wetlands are resplendent with Joe-Pye Weed in late summer. Distal parts are not accessible at high water.

Directions

Park at the northern end of the Lutheran Church lot (36 Cool Street) and head down the gravel path.



14 Mill Island Park



Mill Island Park was once a bustling industrial island with factories and homes. Now the northern end has trails following the perimeter of the island. Special features include scenic views of the Kennebec River and overlooks of the former factory basements. Picnic benches, playground equipment, a large play area,

Directions

Mill Island is located off Bridge Street (Route 139) as it crosses the Kennebec River. The parking lot is at the end of Island Avenue.

Rotary Centennial Trail 3 miles **Easy**

and public restrooms are all here.



This trail was constructed along an old rail bed, level and wide, with a packed gravel surface. It leads through beautiful hardwoods with occasional views of the river. The trail starts with steps up from Crummett Street. It ends at a former rail bridge abutment that extends out into the Kennebec River... a scenic rest spot for a picnic.

Directions

There are two parking spots for the trail, both marked by a TRAIL sign at the nearest main road. **North Entrance:** Crummett Street is the first turn right after the Route 139 bridge from Fairfield over the Kennebec River. Turn immediately right to park. Walk, or push bike up steep granite steps 100 yards south along Crummett Street.

South Entrance: Use the entrance and parking for the Peter Garrett Trail just south of a CMP pole storage yard. Head north to join the Centennial Trail.

Winslow Community Trails



The Winslow School campus is large, with playing fields, woods, and a network of trails. The trails are 10' wide, level and with a packed gravel surface - a great place for an easy jog with or without a stroller, and a safe place for children to learn to ride a bike.

Directions

Park at the end of Dean Street near the trailhead kiosk. Alternatively, park near the tennis courts behind the High School. The network of trails leads around the ball fields and through the woods.

Fort Halifax Park



0.5 mile Easy

An historic, scenic and charming recreational destination. Wander freely along or off the trails, down to the Sebasticook-Kennebec confluence, and back up to the bandstand and the last remaining blockhouse of Fort Halifax. Bring your family for a picnic at one of the shelters. Watch the birds on

Directions

The Park is one mile south of the Winslow-Waterville bridge and just north of the Sebasticook bridge, at 137 Bay Street. There is convenient parking.

South Sebasticook Trail

A dam once impounded the Sebasticook River as a lake. This trail follows the lake's former shoreline. There is also great fishing at the river's current shoreline. This location is exceptionally quiet, despite being less than ½ mile from a busy bridge, with no buildings or roads visible at all...just the

river and its shoreline woodlands. Directions

Park left of Pleau's Store (junction of China Road and the Sebasticook bridge), or drive behind Pleau's along a dirt road, left from a CMP substation to a small parking area. The boat access is at the end of the dirt trail from this latter parking area. For fishing, walk along the shoreline from off the Pleau's parking lot, or the boat access. The trail walking access leads up through the pine woods, then down a gully to the trail along the former

Benton River Park






Just south of the Benton Town Office is a public park with a pretty gazebo. Walk beyond for a scenic riverside trail along the Sebasticook River towards the hydro dam.

Directions

From Winslow, take Clinton Avenue (Route 100) to the junction with Route 139. From Fairfield take Route 139 to Clinton Avenue. The Town Office is at 1279 Clinton Avenue.
